Message from the Chief of Police Annual Crime Statistics

The PVE Police Department closely monitors crime statistics and looks for trends that provide insight into how to best provide police services. The review of crime statistics is presented on an annual basis and provided in the first City Newsletter of each year.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation which is responsible for maintaining crime statistics, uses a national reporting system termed Part 1 Crimes. Part 1 Crimes are defined by the FBI for the purpose of tracking crime and for comparing one jurisdiction to another. Part 1 Crimes are not intended to paint a complete picture of criminal conduct, but represent a cross-section of major crimes. It is important to note that some of the offenses that plague Palos Verdes Estates residents are not reflected in this chart. For instance, the crime of Identity Theft is recorded as occurring not where the victim resides, but where the crime (where the goods were purchased) took place. While Part 1 Crimes don't tell the whole story, they

do provide insight. That said; Part 1 Crime statistics bear out that, once again, Palos Verdes Estates is one of the safest communities in our nation.

It is important to note that in both 2011 and 2012, Part 1 Crimes decreased from the previous year, despite Assembly Bill 109 – commonly referred to as the Public Safety Realignment Bill. This Bill started with a U.S. Supreme Court ruling that California prisons overcrowding violated prisoners' constitutional rights. In order to meet guidelines set by the court for the prison population, the State implemented AB 109, which shifts much of the prisoner burden to county jails.

Over 500 crimes have been re-classified as "non-serious", "non-violent" and "non-sexual" which allows these perpetrators to be housed in county jails instead of the state prison system. Since Los Angeles County jails are also facing overcrowding issues, many of these prisoners are placed into the Post Release Community Supervision (PRCS) program instead of serving full sentences. It is anticipated that



Nixle

BE IN THE KNOW!



ixle is a communication system that connects residents with the agencies that serve and protect them. Residents

can use Nixle to receive information ranging from emergency alerts to community news. This notification service will alert residents to emergency weather events, road closures, public safety advisories, natural and man-made disasters, and general community information by text message, email, over the Web or on a mobile device. Please note that your cell phone provider's text messaging rates will apply.

The Nixle program is free and it is easy to sign up.

1. Go to www.Nixle.com and click on the "Sign

Up Free!" button

- Create a user name and password and identify where you would like to receive the notifications.
- 3. Finally, click on the "Sign Me Up" button to complete the registration. To select which notifications to receive, go to "Settings" and check the agency. You may check only "PVE" or others, depending on your interest. Please note: to receive only emergency alerts, select that item only. LAPD and Sheriffs send many routine announcements in which many of our residents are not interested.

Scam Targeting Seniors



ecently, the PVE Police Department has taken several reports regarding a scam lately known as the "Grandparent Scam." This has

happened to several generous victims lately, costing them thousands of dollars.

What is the "Grandparent Scam?" Scammers can obtain your phone number or email address through

various public sources including telephone lists, social network sites like Facebook or Twitter, obituaries and even lists from hacked email accounts. They typically call elderly people, often in the middle of the night, and claim to be a friend or relative, often a grandchild, and need help dealing with an emergency: their car is broken down or they have been in an accident; they need bail money; they need to pay customs fees to get back into the US from another country; they have been mugged. scammer will request that you send them money *immediately*, often via wire transfer, and may ask you to not tell anyone because they are embarrassed or scared of getting into trouble. They may also have you talk to someone else who claims to be an attorney, law enforcement official or a judge.

What can you do to protect yourself? If you get a call or email from someone claiming to know you and asking for help, check to confirm that it's

legitimate before you send any money. Ask some questions that would be hard for an imposter to answer correctly – the name of the person's pet, for example, or the date of their mother's birthday. Directly contact the person who the scammer claims to be. If you can't reach the person, contact someone else – a friend or relative of the person. Don't send money unless you're sure it's the real person you know. For more information about protecting yourself from fraud, go to www.consumerfed.org/fraud.

Collection is scheduled for Saturday, May 4th. Items should be placed at curbside no later than 6:00 a.m. *Please note:* Any items placed at the curb after 6:00 a.m. will not be taken.

The City's waste hauler, Athens Services, defines special refuse as: furniture; appliances; water heaters; refrigerators (compressors removed); stoves; sinks; lawn furniture; doors; windows; screens; mattresses; beds; rugs. Unacceptable items include: construction waste; green waste; hazardous waste; electronic waste.

Household Hazardous Waste Round-Up Saturday, May 11, 2013

(HHW)/Electronics
Waste (E-Waste) Roundup will be held Saturday,
May 11, 2013 from 9:00

a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the Rancho Palos Verdes City Hall/City Yard located at 30940 Hawthorne Boulevard. This event is jointly sponsored by the Los Angeles County Sanitation Districts and the Department of Public Works. The Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Collection Program provides the opportunity to properly dispose of unwanted household chemicals that cannot be disposed of regularly.

What can you bring?

- Motor Oil, Antifreeze, Paint, Paint Thinner.
- Turpentine, Cleaners with Acids or Lye.
- Pesticides and Herbicides.
- · Household and Car Batteries.
- Old Computers and Television Sets.
- Sharps or Used Needles.
- Expired Pharmaceuticals and Mercury Thermometers.

What will not be accepted?

- Explosives, Ammunition or Radioactive materials.
- Waste from Businesses will NOT be accepted.
- Trash or Old Tires.
- White Goods such as Washers, Stoves, Refrigerators or Air Conditioners.

In general there is a limit of 15 gallons or 125 lbs. per vehicle. Please bring items in their original labeled containers in a sturdy box that can be left at the site. Do not mix products together. For more information, please contact (800) 238-0172.

Also, remember, the City of Palos Verdes Estates accepts electronic waste Monday – Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. at the City Yard (found at the lower level of City Hall, adjacent to the Police Department). Drop-off is for <u>electronic waste only</u>. For safety reasons, please park on the street in front of the building (parallel to Palos Verdes Drive West).

You may also drop-off both HHW & E-Waste year round at the Gaffey SAFE center located at 1400 N. Gaffey Street (opposite the DMV), which is open every Saturday and Sunday from 9:00 am to 3:00 p.m. Latex paint may also be disposed of at Lunada Bay Hardware located at 2216 Via Anacapa in Palos Verdes Estates.

City Council Accepting Applications for City Commissions and Committees

Applications are due to the City Clerk's office by Friday, April 26th, with City Council interviews scheduled in late-May to early-June. swim lessons at the PVBAC pool beginning in June for club members and non-members.


Three-week Swim Lesson Sessions;
